Across the country, data centers are getting a lot of attention. Some of that attention is fair, and some of it is based on misunderstanding. Data centers use a large amount of energy, and members are right to ask what that means for reliability, rates and the long-term strength of our utility systems.

At JCE Co-op, we believe those questions deserve straight answers.

Data centers are the physical backbone of many services we use every day: online banking, medical records, school systems, farm technology, local business software, weather tools, emergency communications, streaming and artificial intelligence. Behind many of those services is a data center keeping information moving.

They are also part of a larger infrastructure conversation. Modern communities depend on reliable electricity, natural gas and strong fiber connectivity. Homes, farms, schools, healthcare providers, local businesses and public safety services all rely on systems that must be powered, connected and dependable. As technology changes, JCE Co-op's role is to plan carefully for the electric, natural gas and communication infrastructure our members and communities will need.

The first truth is simple: data centers require significant power. They run around the clock and need reliable service, cooling systems and backup equipment. That kind of electric load must be studied carefully. JCE Co-op will not treat it like an ordinary service request. Our teams review system capacity,

substation needs, transmission impacts, construction timing, power supply and cost responsibility before any major project moves forward.

One common concern is that data centers automatically raise bills for everyone else. That does not have to be true. The key is making sure large-load projects pay their fair share. Existing members should not subsidize private development. If upgrades are needed to serve a data center, those costs must be identified up front and assigned fairly through engineering studies, rate review, contracts and construction agreements.

Handled properly, a large energy user can also help strengthen the cooperative. For example, electric systems have many fixed costs: poles, wires, substations, trucks, technology, maintenance, dispatching and right-of-way work. Those costs exist whether the system is growing or not. When a large member pays the proper rates and covers the cost of needed upgrades, it can help spread fixed costs over more energy sales, support long-term system investment and help stabilize future rates for all members.

Another concern is that data centers bring no local value. While they may not employ as many people as a large factory, they can still benefit communities. They can increase the local tax base, support construction jobs, create technical positions, attract related businesses and help justify stronger electric, natural gas and fiber infrastructure. For rural areas, modern infrastructure matters. It helps communities compete for investment that might otherwise go somewhere else.

JCE Co-op also understands the concern about reliability. No member wants growth if it means weaker service. That is why our planning includes the real work behind the scenes: staking, material lead times, crew schedules, capacity, outage planning and storm response needs. Growth cannot get ahead of the system.

To lessen the impact on members, JCE Co-op is taking a member-first approach. That includes requiring engineering studies, reviewing rates, using contracts and deposits when appropriate,

coordinating with energy suppliers, phasing projects when needed and making sure large users pay their fair share.

Data centers should not be accepted blindly. They also should not be feared automatically. With careful planning, fair cost recovery and honest communication, data center growth can be positive for JCE Co-op members.

Our commitment is simple: growth should benefit the membership, not burden it.

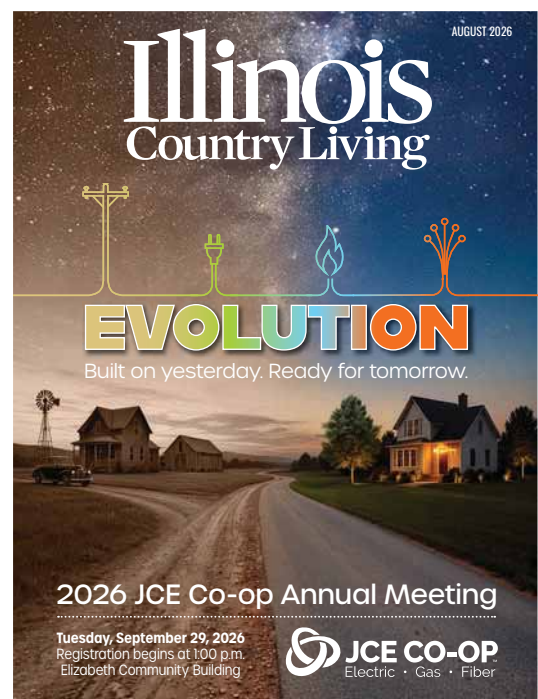

PEAK ALERT!

Due to high demand on the regional grid, please shift flexible electricity use until after 7 p.m.



PEAK ALERTS

Small changes that help power our community!

Think of a Peak Alert like rush hour for electricity.

On hot summer afternoons, many of us get home around the same time, lower the thermostat, cook supper, run laundry and plug in devices. Across the JCE Co-op system, that creates a spike in electricity use called peak demand.

A Peak Alert is JCE Co-op's way of asking members to help ease that "traffic jam." It's not about running out of power—it's about working together for a few hours to keep the grid reliable and help control power costs.

Why peak demand matters

Electricity must be generated the moment it's used. When demand rises sharply, the system must respond immediately, and those are often the

most expensive hours to provide power. Even small reductions in electricity use help reduce strain on the grid and can lower costs over time.

What happens during a Peak Alert?

During a Peak Alert, JCE Co-op asks members to temporarily reduce electricity use, typically on hot afternoons and early evenings. Most alerts last just a few hours. The goal isn't to make anyone uncomfortable—it's simply to shift energy-intensive tasks to a later time. When enough members make small changes, the combined impact is significant.

What you can do to help



Raise your thermostat

Set your thermostat to 78 degrees or higher if you can do so safely and comfortably.



Shift laundry and dishes

Wait until later in the evening to run the dishwasher, washing machine or dryer. These appliances use a lot of energy.



Close blinds and curtains

Blocking direct sunlight helps keep your home cooler.



Unplug unused electronics

Chargers, televisions, gaming systems and other electronics can use small amounts of power even when they are not actively being used.



Skip the oven

Ovens add heat to your home, which makes your air conditioner work harder. Try using a microwave, toaster oven, slow cooker or outdoor grill instead.



Turn off lights in empty rooms

This is one of the easiest steps. If no one is using the room, flip the switch.

Small changes add up

No one member has to do everything. Raising the thermostat a few degrees, waiting to run laundry or closing the blinds before leaving for work may seem small, but together those actions make a real difference across the system.

That's the power of a cooperative. When JCE Co-op issues a Peak Alert, it's not an emergency—it's a request to work together for a few hours to help keep power reliable and costs under control.

Small changes. Big impact. Thanks for helping power our community.

Our construction crews are making strong progress throughout the Connect Illinois Round 3 Broadband Grant project in rural Whiteside, Carroll and Jo Daviess counties, while village and city neighborhoods continue advancing through each phase of construction.

Throughout the summer, you may see our crews marking utilities, preparing overhead and underground infrastructure, installing fiber lines and fusion splicing the network to prepare neighborhoods for service.

Resume of Minutes

May 27, 2026

Board Meeting Minutes Summary

The regular board meeting of Jo-Carroll Energy, Inc. (NFP) was held on Wednesday, May 27, 2026, at 9:00 a.m.

Safety Moment – Director Hendren shared important seasonal safety information regarding hazardous plants and invasive species. He highlighted common toxic plants such as poison ivy, poison sumac, and poison hemlock, and explained what to look for to avoid exposure.

Approval of Agenda – A motion was made, seconded and carried unanimously to approve the meeting agenda.

Consent Agenda – A motion was made, seconded and carried unanimously to approve the Consent Agenda, which included the April 30th Minutes/Summary, Board Expense Summary, Discounted Estate Summary and written reports from staff and the CEO.

Presentation – A safety presentation was provided by Alex Peebles, who updated the Board and senior staff on current OSHA metrics, key safety updates, and upcoming safety training sessions scheduled for staff development.

Governance Topics and Board Policy Review

Wholesale Power Contract Video – A video was presented on the Dairyland Wholesale Power Contract, which helps JCE Co-op secure a reliable, long-term power supply for our member-consumers while reducing exposure to short-term market swings. It also supports stronger planning for system growth, rate stability and resource needs.

Review and Discuss the Dairyland Power Cooperative 2026 Proposed bylaw Amendments and Resolutions

– After reviewing the materials before the meeting, the Board discussed the proposed 2026 bylaw amendments and resolutions in preparation for Dairyland's annual meeting.

CEO | CFO Report

President & CEO Report – President and CEO Mike Casper discussed the importance of JCE's ongoing review of its governance policies and bylaws, noting that it helps ensure consistency throughout the organization, creates alignment, and strengthens the cooperative's value to its members. Casper also provided an update on the new Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) upgrades and the implementation of the NISC software system. These investments support long-term stability, improve operational efficiency, and help ensure consistent and equitable treatment of all members.

Financial Operating Report – Emily Doland, Chief Financial Officer, noted that April Revenue is approximately \$26 million. Total operations and maintenance expenses are approximately \$20 million. Margins are approximately \$1 million. By general consent, the board moved to file the financial operating report with the auditor.

Operations and Regulatory Legislative Update

Operations Update – Kyle Buros, Senior Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, provided an update on the continued expansion of JCE's fiber network, highlighting the recent milestone of connecting our 10,000th subscriber. Buros also shared that JCE received an extension on its Illinois Connect Round 3 grant, allowing additional time to complete the grant-funded project.

Cooperative Services Update

– Jennifer Meyer, Vice President of Cooperative Services, provided information on administrative billing policies, including the use of estimated bills. She explained that JCE Co-op's billing practices are intended to provide

uniform and equitable treatment of members. When an estimated bill is necessary, usage is calculated by considering prior usage history, including the previous month's usage and usage during similar periods in prior years.

Human Resources and Marketing Update – Merri Sevey, Executive Vice President of Human Resources, provided an update on fiber subscriber metrics from the Sales and Scheduling team, highlighting an average of 10.4 new subscriber sign-ups per day. Sevey also noted an increase in phone service sales, attributed in part to another telecommunications provider discontinuing its phone service offerings, creating an opportunity for JCE to provide additional services needed for our members.

IT Technology Report – Dan Marcure, Vice President and Chief Technology Officer, shared details on a new fiber ring being installed. A fiber ring is a network design where fiber routes form a loop rather than a single line. The main benefit is redundancy – if the fiber is cut or equipment fails at one point, data can travel the opposite direction around the ring, helping maintain service and reducing outages. Similar to our electric service, this project will improve the reliability of JCE's fiber network by providing a backup route for internet and communication services, helping keep members connected even if part of the network experiences an outage.

External Affairs | Legislative Update - Terry Kurt, General Counsel, discussed with the Board of Directors the proposed bylaw amendments that will be presented and considered at the upcoming annual meeting of Dairyland Power Cooperative on June 2. Kurt reviewed the proposed changes and their potential implications to help prepare directors for discussion and voting during the meeting.

Board Issues and Action Items

Select NRECA Course Attendees for BLC Course 928 Artificial Intelligence for Cooperatives – Attendees were selected to attend BLC Course 928.

Select Attendees for the AIEC Annual Meeting – Attendees were selected to attend the AIEC Annual Meeting.

Select AIEC Voting Delegate & Alternate Voting Delegate – A motion was made to select Director Jerry Meyer as the Voting Delegate, and Joe Mattingley as the Alternate Voting Delegate for the AIEC Annual Meeting, which was seconded and carried unanimously.

Executive Session

Into Executive Session – A motion was made, seconded and carried unanimously to go into Executive Session at 11:09 AM.

Out of Executive Session – A motion was made, seconded and carried unanimously to come out of Executive Session at 11:45 AM.

Action Resulting from Executive Session – A motion was made, seconded and carried unanimously to follow existing billing policies 403 and 405.

(AIEC) Report – Chairman Senn provided an update on the latest AIEC board meeting and topics of Illinois legislation that affect cooperatives.

American Public Gas Association (APGA) Report

– Director Carroll reported on APGA's recent meetings and provided an update on the latest activities within the natural gas industry.

Dairyland Power Cooperative (DPC Report)

– Director Tindell provided highlights from the most recent Dairyland board meeting.

Prairie Power (PPI) Report

– Director Kuhns provided generation data from PPI's units. The board did not meet in April.

Adjournment – Chairman Senn adjourned the meeting at 12:15 p.m.
