Emergency Preparedness During An Electrical Outage

SEPTEMBER IS NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH. Weather, accidents and storms can disrupt the electricity we are so used to having. Sometimes electricity flickers momentarily then comes back. But serious damage to power lines and the electrical grid can cause outages for days, or weeks.

Here's valuable information to keep you safe and comfortable during a power outage of any length.

Short-term power failures

Don't panic! Check to see if your neighbors still have electricity. If they do, the problem could be inside your home. Check your main fuses or circuit breakers to see if they have blown or tripped. Replacing a fuse or resetting a circuit breaker may restore your electricity.

If the problem is not in your home, call your electric supplier. A repair person will be dispatched as quickly as possible. Your supplier should also be able to tell you if it will be an extended outage.

Unplug appliances with electronic components, such as microwaves, televisions and computers. This will help to eliminate damage to your appliances from voltage surges when the electricity is restored. Wait a few minutes before turning on these appliances when the electricity is restored. This will reduce demand on the power supplier's electrical system.

Long-term power failures

If you use a standby generator, be sure it has been installed and wired properly. If improperly installed, a generator could cause dangerous conditions for the utility supplier's employees working to restore the power. Your generator could be damaged when the power is restored if a double throw disconnect is not used and properly installed.

Of course, it is also important to be sure that a fresh supply of fuel to power the generator is on hand and stored properly.

Storm Preparedness cont...

To make an outage easier to cope with, keep an adequate supply of the following on hand:

- Flashlights, Battery-operated radio, Extra supply of batteries for flashlights and radio
- Portable phone charger, Drinking water and non-perishable food, can opener, Basic first-aid supplies, Hand sanitizer, Prescriptions, pain reliever, Warm clothing, Blankets, Important documents, Money, Baby supplies, and pet supplies if needed.

Keep in a cool, dry place and make sure all members of the family know where to find them.

Check the basement periodically for flooding. You can use a portable, gasoline-powered pump to pump out a basement or crawl space when the power is interrupted. Never wade into a flooded basement unless electricity has been disconnected.

Never go near downed power lines; report them immediately and let qualified people from the utility company handle these situations. Lines do not have to be arcing or sparking to be live. Any utility wire, including telephone or cable lines sagging or down could be in contact with an energized power line making them also very dangerous, so stay away from all of them.

Following these suggestions will make it easier to cope with a power outage. Think ahead and be prepared for an emergency by having a plan for your household.

Remember to stay calm. The electricity will be back on as quickly as possible. Your electric supplier is working around the clock to restore your service.



Farm Equipment Safety Tips

- Keep yourself and equipment at least 10 feet away from power lines at all times. Use a spotter when moving tall equipment and loads.
- Encourage drivers and operators to position grain augers in their lowest position or to lower truck bed boxes before moving. Use a spotter to make certain you stay far away from power lines.
- Never attempt to raise or move a power line to clear a path. If power lines near your property have sagged over time, call your utility to repair them.
- **If you are on equipment that contacts a power line, do not exit the equipment.** When you step off the equipment, you become the electricity's path to ground and receive a potentially fatal shock. Wait until utility workers have de-energized the line and confirmed it is safe for you to exit. If the vehicle is on fire and you must exit, jump clear of the vehicle with both feet together. Hop as far from the vehicle as you can with your feet together. Keep your feet together to prevent current flow through your body, which could be deadly.

Contact MJM about damaged or downed power lines or poles. Utility crews would much rather check out an issue than risk a potentially dangerous situation.

ENERGY EFFICIENCY TIP OF THE MONTH

September kicks off the fall shoulder season, when cooler mornings and milder evenings often mean you can give your heating and cooling system a break. Open windows, use ceiling fans and enjoy the fresh air whenever temperatures allow. It's also the perfect time to schedule annual HVAC maintenance before colder weather arrives. Because demand is typically lower during the fall, heating and cooling professionals often have greater availability, making it easier to book an appointment. Regular maintenance can improve your system's efficiency, help prevent unexpected breakdowns and keep your home comfortable all year long.
